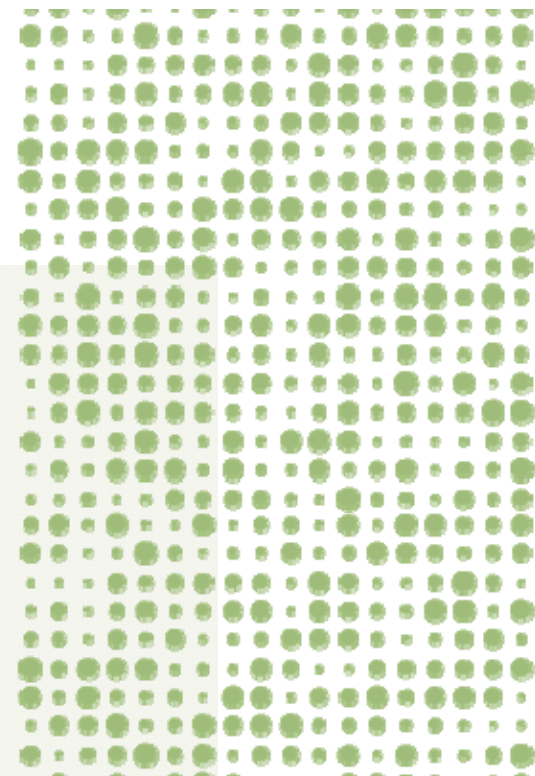


Superfund Task Force and Goal 4, Recommendation 39

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Formation of the Superfund Task Force and Recommendations

- In May 2017, the Administration released a memo calling for the establishment of a Superfund Task Force charged with identifying ways to expedite cleanups and promote redevelopment of contaminated properties at EPA Superfund Sites.
- In July 2017, EPA released a report containing the Task Force's 42 recommendations
- Over the two-year duration of the Task Force—from July 2017 to July 2019—EPA convened workgroups and identified specific tasks for implementing each recommendation

Goal 4: Promoting Redevelopment and Community Revitalization



- The Task Force developed several recommendations specifically aimed at increasing the number of Superfund sites that are returned to productive use
- Strategy 1: Facilitate site redevelopment and support ongoing information sharing
- Strategy 2: Utilize reuse planning to lay the foundation and set expectations for site redevelopment



Goal 4, Recommendation 39: Overview

- Recommendation 39: Engage and facilitate public/private partnerships to share information and resources and work toward advancing and promoting the revitalization of the site
- Implementation: In the past two years, EPA provided or continues to provide technical assistance to more than 30 communities in all 10 EPA regions through the regional seed projects and ongoing regionally funded support

Goal 4, Recommendation 39: Future

- EPA has fully integrated this recommendation into its ongoing mission of helping communities realize their vision for reusing Superfund sites
- Building on the past two years of successfully supporting and promoting public/private partnerships, we will continue to work with communities to provide updated site information, reuse assessments, reuse planning support, and visioning workshops





College Underserved/Community Partnership Program (CUPP)

- Through CUPP, EPA partners with colleges and universities to assist underserved communities with vital technical support through student internships and capstone projects.
- Students work on a range of plans and projects that help communities gain access to resources that can improve the economic future and overall quality of life for the community.
