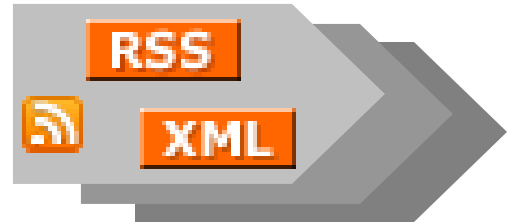


RSS Fact Sheet



Information about RSS news feeds and organizations that offer them

What is RSS?

RSS (or Really Simple Syndication) is a free service that automatically sends information about new web content. RSS saves users from having to repeatedly visit favorite Web sites to check for new content or be notified of updates via email. EPA uses RSS to transmit news headlines which link back to <http://www.epa.gov> for full-text news releases and, through them, related content on the web.

What do I need to use RSS?

To receive RSS feeds, you need a program known as a feed reader or aggregator that can automatically check RSS-enabled web pages that you select, and then display any updated information that it finds. There are numerous feed readers available, including many which are free of charge. Most are simply desktop programs that you download and install on your computer. There are also Web-based feed readers that require no software installation and make the "feeds" available on any computer with Web access. Once the news reader program is set up, you are ready to subscribe to the RSS content feeds you want.

How can I get a feed reader?

The on-line encyclopedia Wikipedia (http://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/List_of_news_aggregators) lists dozens of feed or news readers. You may also search using the terms "RSS readers" on either Yahoo (<http://www.yahoo.com>), Google (<http://www.google.com>) or your favorite search engine. Each reader offers various capabilities so you are encouraged to review the readers available and select one that best meets your needs. Why use RSS?

RSS alerts you to new content that interests you. Subscribing to an epa.gov RSS feed makes you one of the first to know when a news announcement has been issued. We offer a variety of RSS feeds to subscribe to so you can select news releases of greatest interest to you. You can also use RSS on other Web sites including news organizations, technology companies and other government agencies. 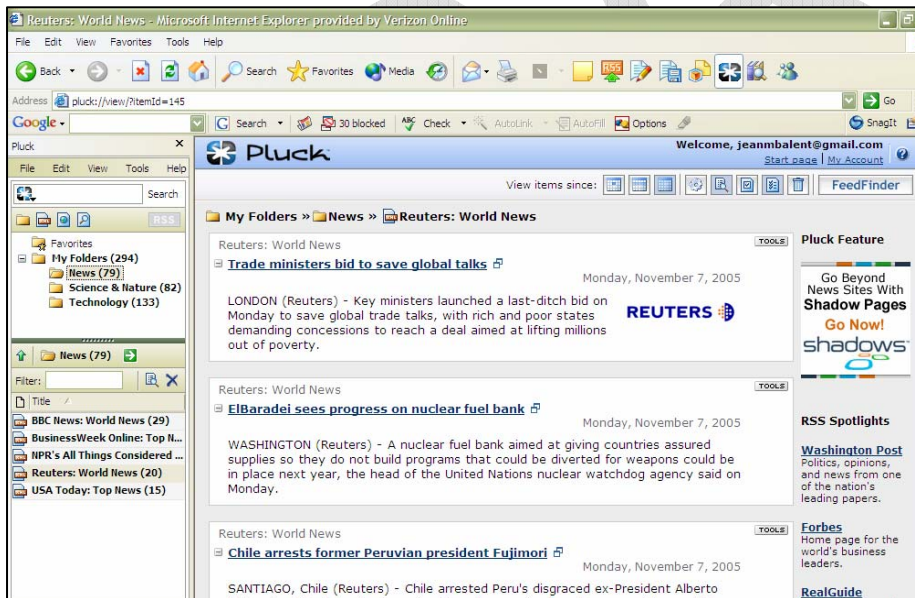
Free!

Basic Tool.

This tool functions as a separate website where selected feeds are listed and updated. Users review feeds by opening the URL for Google Reader:

www.google.com/reader.

Users must create a Google account (available for free) to use this tool.



Pluck -

Simple tool.

A dedicated toolbar for Pluck is available on the side of the user's Internet Explorer (IE) screen. Users can access Pluck via an icon on the desktop, quick launch tray, or IE browser. Users can set up notification "pop-ups" each time new feeds are available as well as regularly search for a particular term with the "persistent search" option.

Stand-alone software – a separate tool is installed on the users PC, offers more options to users for management of feeds

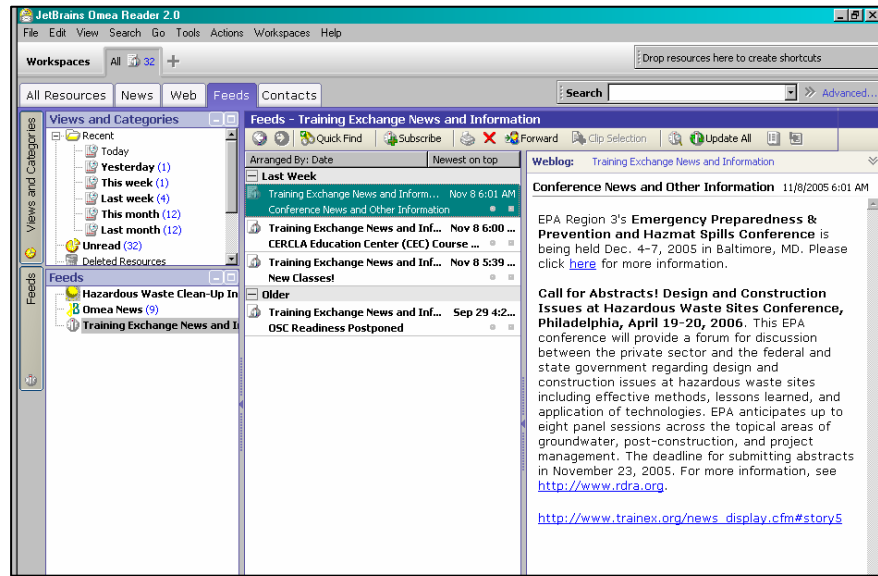
Omea Reader

Advanced Tool!

This tool allows for advanced management options such as forwarding of clips, flagging and categorizing feeds. Users can also subscribe to a special search feed on select search engines in addition to saving specified searches for regular use. Omea also offers an embedded IE toolbar for quick adding of feeds.



wTicker

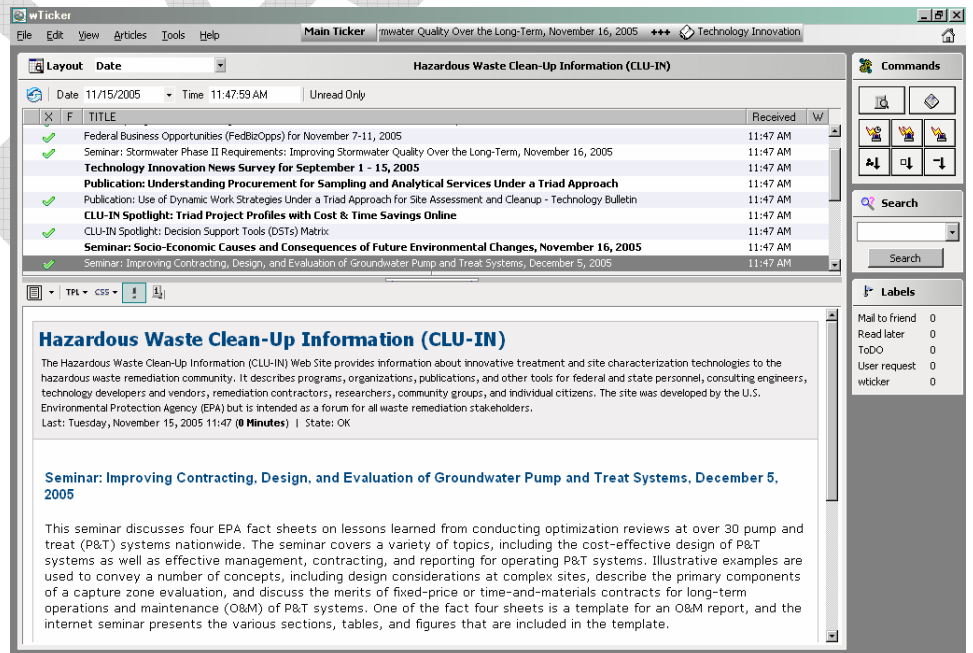

Highly Sophisticated

Tool.

This tool allows the user to manage feeds with labels and categories as well as create user-defined watches for specific items. wTicker also offers a scrolling banner or "ticker" of feed updates that can be displayed at all times on a desktop. Users can also listen to each feed using the Speak command. Feeds are added using the "New Feed Channel" option.
